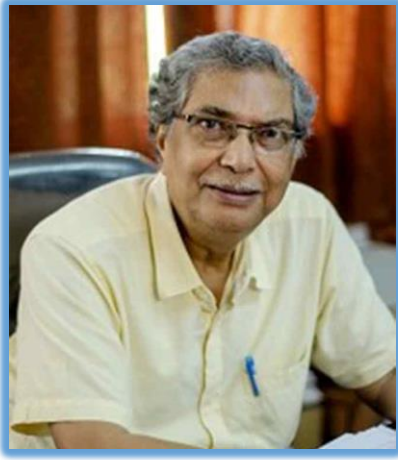

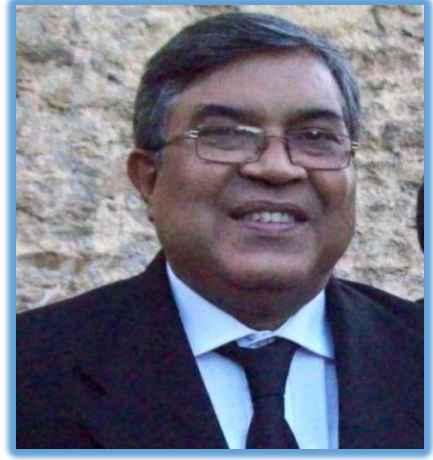

Retired as a Professor from the ETCE Department at Jadavpur University and as Professor and Coordinator of the Green Energy Centre at IEST, Shibpur. The inventor of Central Charging for Solar Lanterns, designed and facilitated the installation of India's first Solar Power Plant in Simlipal Forest in 1989. From the desk of the the Chairman

Dear Shareholders,

It gives me immense pleasure to welcome you all to the Annual Report of Agni Green Power Limited for the financial year ended March 31, 2026. Over the past year, India's clean energy transition has accelerated rapidly, evolving beyond basic capacity expansion toward sustained operational reliability, engineering precision, and asset intelligence.

At Agni Green Power, our foundational strength has always been rooted in practical research, technological self-reliance, and field-tested engineering. In an operating landscape that increasingly demands smarter energy systems, our priority has been to integrate robust hardware engineering with digital intelligence to deliver long-term plant dependability. During the year under review, our research and engineering teams achieved critical milestones in proprietary Internet of Things (IoT) hardware and plant telematics. We successfully developed an in-house, multi-channel Smart Solar Data Logger equipped with integrated LTE, Wi-Fi, and field-bus communications for seamless plant data acquisition even in rugged environmental conditions. Alongside this, we engineered wireless RS-485 transceiver nodes that eliminate cumbersome ground trenching between string inverters, enabling robust wireless network topologies across solar fields. Complementing these systems is our newly designed Analog-to-Modbus weather and telemetry interface, which unifies critical sensors—including solar irradiance, cell temperature, ambient air temperature, wind speed, wind direction, humidity, and digital inputs—into standardized Modbus networks to ensure accurate, real-time Performance Ratio tracking.

Parallel to our hardware developments, we fortified our internal project governance and commercial agility by deploying a suite of proprietary enterprise digital portals. To maintain rigorous financial control across ongoing EPC sites, we launched the Project Cost Tracking Portal (PCTP), enabling live tracking of site budgets against actual disbursements. We introduced the Project Handover Portal to streamline transitions between execution and maintenance teams, and the Design Tracker to provide full lifecycle visibility over engineering schematics and revision approvals. Furthermore, the newly integrated IT Asset Management Portal centralizes corporate resource allocation, while our client-facing Solar Benefit Calculator dynamically evaluates project ROI, payback timelines, and carbon offsets to generate instantaneous pre-proposals. By synthesizing intelligent hardware telemetry with automated operational platforms, we are accelerating our transformation into a digitally empowered clean-tech enterprise. I extend my sincere gratitude to my fellow Board members, our engineers, researchers, and valued stakeholders for their continued belief in our technological roadmap.

From the desk of the the Managing Director

Dear Valued Members & Stakeholders,

It is a privilege to share with you the operational review and performance highlights of Agni Green Power Limited for the financial year 2025–26. The year under review was defined by project execution rigor, prudent resource management, and balance sheet strengthening across our turnkey solar EPC and O&M divisions. In a competitive market characterized by shifting component pricing and project timelines, our teams demonstrated commendable agility to safeguard operating margins and deliver dependable clean-energy solutions to our clients. Central priority this year was improving underlying operational efficiency and cleaning up legacy exposures. We achieved significant cost optimization this year, alongside reductions in direct site and assembly expenses. This allowed our Profit Before Tax (before exceptional items) to surge by **123.28%** to **₹1.89 Crores** compared to **₹84.69 Lakh** in the previous financial year. Demonstrating prudent accounting governance, the Company absorbed an exceptional one-time charge of **₹74.96 Lakh** to definitively resolve and write off legacy receivables from earlier financial years. Despite this one-time impact, Net Profit After Tax grew by 120% to **₹84.45 Lakh**. As we enter FY 2026–27, we aim to leverage our execution credentials to participate selectively in margin-accretive institutional tenders, strengthen commercial rooftop engagements, and enhance working capital velocity. Agni Green Power Limited targets a robust multi-year scale-up from 7.3 MW and ₹38 Crore revenue in FY 25–26 to 25 MW and ₹75 Crore by FY 27–28. By FY 29–30, operational capacity is targeted to reach 50 MW with a turnover of ₹150 Crore, marking an aggressive seven-fold installation expansion. I convey my sincere appreciation to our engineers, staff, vendors, and clients for their dedication. I am equally grateful to State Bank of India and our financial partners, as well as our shareholders, for their sustained confidence in our operational trajectory.

Our History

Agni Green Power Limited is pioneer in turnkey solar photovoltaic solutions and engineering, procurement, and construction (EPC) services, operating across the complete lifecycle from feasibility and design to manufacturing, installation, and long-term operations and maintenance.

The company trace its roots to 1991–92 with the formation of Agni Electronics, a partnership firm established by technical specialists including founder Dr. Kanak Mukhopadhyay & Prof. Hiranmay Saha to serve rural populations through non-conventional energy applications. To formally scale these operations and acquire the existing firm's business, Agni Power and Electronics Private Limited was incorporated in Kolkata on August 25, 1995.

During its formative years, the company established a strong track record in remote and island off-grid electrification. A major milestone came in 1997 with the installation of an off-grid solar PV plant at Sagar Island in West Bengal, followed by partnerships with Bharat Heavy Electricals Limited (BHEL) around 2000 to deliver cumulative solar PV plants across Andaman & Nicobar and Lakshadweep.

Over the following decade, the company vertically integrated its operations by initiating indigenous production of Solar Power Conditioning Units (PCUs) in 2005, later entering into a technology licensing agreement with Australia's Magellan Power Systems in 2007 to strengthen its power conversion engineering. Between 2011 and 2020, the enterprise expanded its regional presence across Eastern and North-Eastern India—including operational bases in Chhattisgarh, Mizoram, Tripura, and Assam—while delivering key grid-connected infrastructure. Notable installations include a 500 kWp canal-top project in 2015, a 1 MW rooftop plant at IIT Kharagpur in 2017, and the 1 MW NKDA canal-top project in New Town, Kolkata in 2020. Alongside EPC activities, the company expanded its manufacturing footprint at the Srijan Industrial Logistic Park in Howrah, West Bengal, producing Balance of System (BOS) components, solar pump controllers, and hybrid PCUs. In early 2022, the company rebranded to Agni Green Power Private Limited and converted into a public entity as Agni Green Power Limited on April 1, 2022, before listing on the NSE Emerge platform. Backed by an in-house Research and Development unit in Kolkata, the firm holds a SMERA SME 1 technical ability rating and ISO 9001, 14001, and 45001 accreditations, serving both public-sector utilities and commercial clients across India.

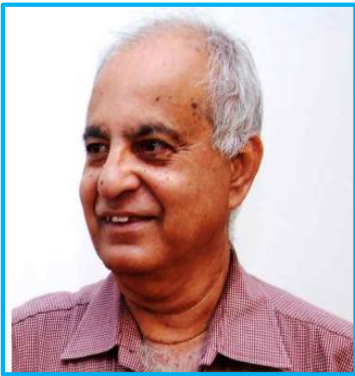
Our Independent Directors

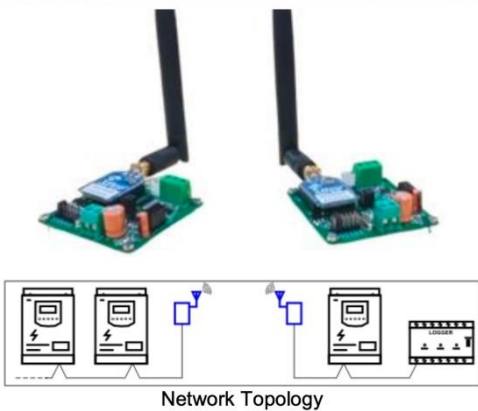

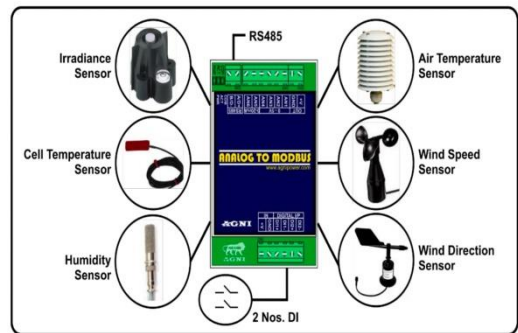


RS485/RS232 WIRELESS BRIDGE:

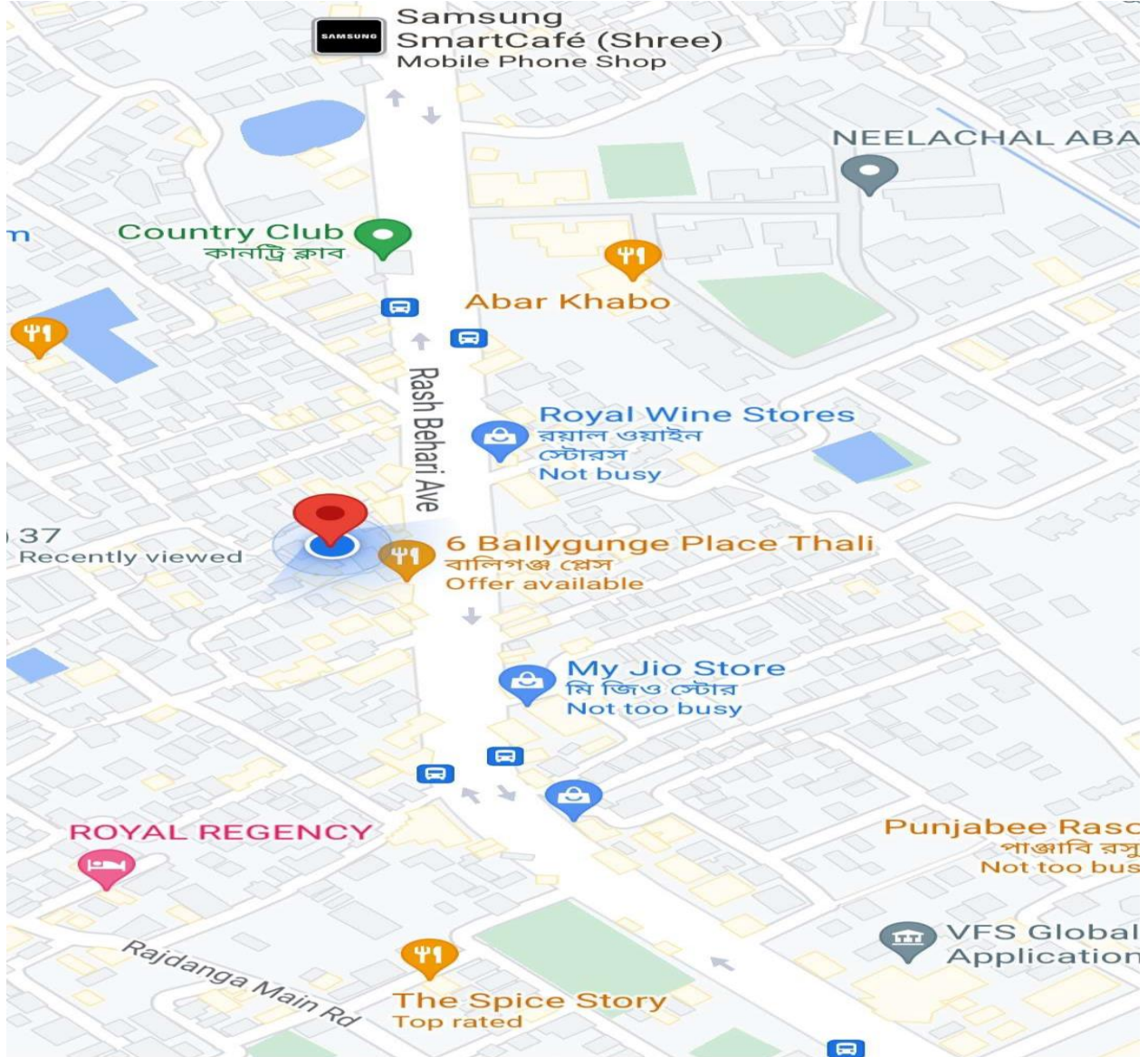

PERFORMANCE REVIEW:

The Company is engaged in the business of manufacture, sale and installation of solar photovoltaic power plants, Solar Street Lights, solar power conditioning units and other solar products like charge controller, solar pump controller, solar adaptors, solar generators, junction boxes etc.

The turnover of the Company for the year under review was Rs. 3,860.55 Lakh compared to Rs. 4,108.89 Lakh in the previous year. During the year under report the Turnover has decreased by nearly 6.42%, Further last year Company has earned a profit of Rs. 38.46 Lakhs but in this financial year company has made a profit of Rs. 84.45 Lakhs profit increased nearly 120%.

Company's core strength lies in acquiring and delivering technology in the niche business segments, gained through intensive interaction with clients and R&D on new technologies. Emphasis are being given on understanding customers' pain points and offering innovative solutions. This would entail long term business relationship with the customers at all levels, specially Government Contracts. The company thrives on providing development support on leading edge technologies for solar power / green power industry. The technologies that are being used are indigenously developed and rigorously tested to be proven as useful before being offered to the customers so as to ensure highest degree of customer satisfaction. A low-cost high quality delivery center helps the company to retain the competitive advantage and that has been the main strategy of the company while serving clients across the country.

STATE OF COMPANY'S AFFAIRS:

Our Company is primarily an EPC company with a dedicated bunch of highly skilled and experienced engineers and technicians having deep commitment to maintain high quality of work and maintenance. We have a strong Design Engineering Team which is geared up for taking up all sorts of challenging designs for solar and hybrid power plants. Also the Company has a dedicated R&D facility to research and develop new indigenous products. This enables the Company to customize its products as per customer requirements. The R&D facility anticipates shifts in consumer preferences and uses emerging technologies to improve existing products. This has reduced dependency on technology outsourcing and ensures product innovation in product quality and features in environment friendly processes.

Solar electricity generated through Solar Photovoltaic (PV) power plants has emerged as one of the most competitive and rapidly expanding sources of electricity in India. The declining cost of solar PV technology, increasing efficiency of modules, economies of scale and supportive government policies have significantly improved the economic viability of solar power compared with conventional fossil-fuel-based sources. Solar power also offers substantial environmental benefits by reducing dependence on coal and gas-based generation and associated greenhouse gas emissions.

In view of the growing concerns relating to climate change, energy security and the transition towards cleaner sources of energy, the Government of India and various State Governments have introduced several policy initiatives to promote renewable energy and solar power. These include provisions for net metering, renewable energy obligations, competitive bidding mechanisms, solar parks and various financial assistance and subsidy schemes for residential, agricultural and other consumers.

A major initiative in the residential rooftop segment is the Pradhan Mantri Surya Ghar: Muft Bijli Yojana (PM Surya Ghar), launched by the Government of India on 13 February 2024 with a total financial outlay of ₹75,021 crore. The scheme aims to facilitate the installation of rooftop solar systems in one crore households and provides Central Financial Assistance to eligible residential consumers. The scheme is

intended to enable households to generate their own electricity and obtain savings/free electricity of up to 300 units per month, depending on their consumption and solar installation.

The implementation of the PM Surya Ghar scheme has accelerated the growth of distributed and residential rooftop solar in India. As of 31 March 2026, cumulative rooftop solar installations had benefited more than 42 lakh households, with the PM Surya Ghar programme alone reaching approximately 34.3 lakh households. During FY 2025-26, approximately 8.71 GW of rooftop solar capacity was added, including about 6.72 GW under the PM Surya Ghar programme.

India achieved a significant milestone in solar energy during FY 2025-26. As on 31 March 2026, India's cumulative installed solar power capacity stood at approximately 150.26 GW, making India one of the world's leading solar markets. This capacity comprised approximately 110.43 GW of utility-scale solar, 25.73 GW of rooftop solar and 14.10 GW of solar capacity under KUSUM and other off-grid projects. During FY 2025-26, India added a record 44.61 GW of solar capacity, compared with 23.83 GW added during FY 2024-25.

The rapid growth of solar power is contributing substantially to India's broader clean-energy transition. As at 31 March 2026, India had 274.68 GW of installed renewable energy capacity, comprising 150.26 GW of solar, 56.09 GW of wind, 11.75 GW of bio-energy, 5.17 GW of small hydro and 51.41 GW of large hydro capacity. Including nuclear power, India's total non-fossil-fuel installed capacity stood at 283.46 GW. India had already achieved the milestone of having 50% of its cumulative installed electricity capacity from non-fossil-fuel sources in June 2025, five years ahead of the 2030 target under its Nationally Determined Contributions.

India's solar expansion is further supported by programmes such as the PM-KUSUM Scheme, which promotes decentralized solar power generation and solarisation of agricultural pumps. The scheme was designed to add 34,800 MW of solar capacity by March 2026, with Central Financial Support of ₹34,422 crores.

The Government's continued policy support, increasing rooftop solar adoption, expansion of utility-scale projects, development of domestic solar manufacturing capabilities and the country's commitment to achieving 500 GW of installed non-fossil-fuel capacity by 2030 are expected to provide significant long-term growth opportunities for the Indian solar energy industry. India is already ranked among the world's leading renewable energy markets and, according to IRENA data cited by the Government of India, ranked third globally in renewable energy installed capacity based on data as of December 2025. During 2010–19, the foreign capital invested in India on Solar power projects was nearly US\$20.7 billion. In FY2024-24, India is planning to issue 40 GW tenders for solar and hybrid projects. India has established nearly 42 solar parks to make land available to the promoters of solar plants. Gujarat Hybrid Renewable Energy Park will generate 30 GWAC power from both solar panels and wind turbines. It will spread over an area of 72,600 hectares (726 km) of waste land in Kutch district of Gujarat.

Many State Governments are also giving increased importance to generate more energy from renewable energy sources to bridge the gap between energy demand and supply and also to supplement grid power. These include programmes for Solar Street Lights for Rural, Urban and Remote Areas, Solar PV Systems for Schools and Community Establishments, Solar PV Power Plants for Village Electrification, Construction of High MW Capacity Grid Connected SPV Power Plant, and Solar PV in off-grid application.

Agni Green Power Limited is positioned on an aggressive operational and financial growth trajectory over the five-year roadmap from FY 25-26 through FY 29-30. Starting from a foundational capacity of 7.3 MW generating ₹38 Crore in FY 25-26, the company outlines a steady, year-on-year ramp-up across both

execution volume and topline turnover. In FY 26-27, operational capacity is targeted to more than double to 15 MW, lifting revenue to ₹45 Crore, before scaling substantially in FY 27-28 to reach 25 MW and ₹75 Crore. Demonstrating continued operational compounding, the project pipeline expands further in FY 28-29 to achieve 35 MW in execution volume alongside an anticipated revenue of ₹105 Crore. By FY 29-30, Agni aims to achieve a benchmark milestone of 50 MW in operational scale, driving top-line revenue to ₹150 Crore—representing a nearly seven-fold expansion in installation capacity and a near four-fold increase in financial turnover over the forecast period, anchored by focused execution, expanding project scale, and sustained operational momentum.

The Company is involved in design, supply, installation and commissioning of all these types of few kW to few MW level solar power plants in different parts of India. Most of them are under Govt tendering procedure but recently a number of solar power plants from private sectors and semi-Govt organizations have been successfully completed by the Company. Notable among them is Selco foundation a 302 kw project

The present scenario of solar PV market is seeing a huge change due to aggressive policy changes of the Govt. and many companies with sound financial changes are entering into the market to tap the MW range power plants on establishing the power plants of large scale (5-500MW range) and selling the energy to the National Grid through competitive bidding process. To tap this market, the Company must have solid financial strength and it is not possible for us to arrange such funding. Moreover, many establishments are now interested to install the power plant at their own premises and want to buy power for the entire life of the plant (around 25 years) from the installer who will arrange financing of their own and will recover the finance through monthly bill payment (RESCO Model). Therefore, in both the above scenario the institutional financing is required which the company is trying to explore to tap this market.

In addition, the company is planning to strengthen its R&D activity for developing capability for designing and manufacturing Solar Inverters and IT enabled applications and EV charging facilities.

DIVIDEND

The Board of Directors of your company, after considering holistically the relevant circumstances has decided that it would be prudent, not to recommend any Dividend for the year under review and retain the profits of the Company for its future growth.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS REPORT

India continued to remain one of the world's fastest-growing major economies in FY 2025–26, with renewable energy playing a central role in the country's growth and sustainability agenda. Supported by strong government policies and increasing private-sector participation, India continued to make significant progress in expanding its solar power capacity.

During the year, India further strengthened its position as a leading global solar power market. As per the Ministry of New & Renewable Energy (MNRE), India's cumulative installed solar capacity reached approximately 143 GW as of 31 March 2026, reflecting substantial growth during the year.

The broader renewable energy sector also witnessed strong expansion. Solar remained the largest contributor to new renewable capacity additions, supported by utility-scale projects, rooftop solar and government initiatives aimed at increasing clean-energy adoption.

The Government's target of achieving 500 GW of installed non-fossil fuel capacity by 2030 continues to be a key driver of the sector. The PM Surya Ghar: Muft Bijli Yojana, with an objective of enabling rooftop solar installations in one crore households by FY 2026–27, has further accelerated opportunities in the residential solar segment.

With significant solar resources, continued policy support and growing demand for clean electricity, India's renewable energy sector continues to offer substantial opportunities for expansion, innovation and investment.

BUSINESS OVERVIEW

Agni Green Power Limited ("AGNI" or "the Company") continued to operate as an integrated solar energy solutions provider during FY 2025–26, offering Engineering, Procurement and Construction ("EPC"), Operations & Maintenance ("O&M") and related solar energy solutions. The Company also continued its manufacturing activities relating to Solar Power Conditioning Units, Solar Inverters, MPPT Chargers, Remote Monitoring and Diagnostic Systems, Solar PV Junction Boxes, Control Panels, Digital DC Energy Meters, Solar Adapters and Solar Pump Controllers, among other products.

During FY 2025–26, the Company continued to strengthen its project execution capabilities and expand its presence across rooftop and ground-mounted solar segments, with a particular focus on government, institutional and public-sector projects. The Company secured and progressed projects across Eastern and North-Eastern India, thereby further strengthening its established presence in these regions.

A significant achievement during the year was the execution of the rooftop solar project at NIT Durgapur under a CSR initiative of Power Grid Corporation of India Limited ("POWERGRID"). The project, having a capacity of approximately 1 MW, was successfully completed and subsequently inaugurated, demonstrating the Company's capabilities in executing institutional rooftop solar projects.

AGNI also successfully commissioned the 2.2 MWp grid-connected solar photovoltaic project at Guna, Madhya Pradesh for GAIL (India) Limited, further reflecting the Company's experience in large-scale solar project execution.

The Company also continued execution of its ground-mounted solar project for Bharat Reserve Bank Note Mudran Private Limited (“BRBNMPL”) at Salboni, West Bengal, comprising a 410 kW AC / 460 kWp DC Solar PV Power Plant. The project further strengthened AGNI's portfolio of institutional and public-sector solar installations.

During March 2026, the Company received a work order from the Tripura Renewable Energy Development Agency (“TREDA”) for design, manufacture, supply, erection, testing and commissioning of 900 kWp grid-connected rooftop solar power plants. The order, valued at approximately ₹4.48 crore, also includes a 10-year warranty/guarantee and Annual Maintenance Contract (“AMC”), with a project completion period of 14 months. This order further strengthened the Company's presence in the rooftop solar segment and in the North-Eastern region.

The Company's execution track record also includes several notable solar installations across institutional and government locations, including the NKDA Administrative Building, IIT Kharagpur solar car-parking facility and MES Barrackpore ground-mounted solar project. These projects demonstrate AGNI's ability to execute solar installations across diverse applications and project sizes.

During the year, AGNI continued to leverage its integrated EPC, O&M, manufacturing and technical capabilities to provide reliable and cost-effective renewable energy solutions. The Company's established relationships with government departments, public sector organisations and institutional customers, together with its experience in rooftop, ground-mounted and off-grid solar applications, provide a strong foundation for continued growth.

With continued government support for renewable energy, increasing adoption of distributed solar power and growing demand from government and institutional customers, the Company remains focused on expanding its project portfolio, strengthening execution capabilities and delivering sustainable solar energy solutions across India.

FACTORS AFFECTING OUR RESULTS OF OPERATION

- **Dependence on Government Policies and Programmes:** Agni Green Power operates in a sector significantly influenced by Central and State Government policies, renewable energy targets, subsidies, incentives, tendering mechanisms and regulatory frameworks. Any reduction, modification or delay in subsidies, incentives, approvals or government programmes may adversely affect project demand, execution timelines and the Company's financial performance.
- **Competitive Industry:** The solar EPC industry remains highly competitive, with participation from large integrated renewable energy companies, established EPC

contractors and regional players. Larger competitors may have stronger financial resources, greater execution capacity, wider customer networks and economies of scale, which may place pressure on project pricing and margins.

- **High Working Capital Requirements:** Solar EPC projects require substantial working capital for procurement of modules, inverters, structures and other equipment, as well as for project execution. Delays in customer payments, particularly in government and institutional projects, may increase working capital requirements and place pressure on liquidity.
- **Limited Pricing Power:** The solar EPC market remains price-sensitive, particularly in government and institutional tenders where contracts are generally awarded through competitive bidding. Intense competition may limit the Company's ability to pass on increases in input, labour, financing and logistics costs.
- **Project Identification and Execution:** The Company's results depend on its ability to identify suitable projects, secure orders and execute projects within the stipulated time and cost. Delays in approvals, site readiness, material availability, grid connectivity, weather conditions or other project-related factors may affect revenues, margins and cash flows.

OPPORTUNITIES

- **Strong Growth in India's Renewable Energy Sector:** India's continued focus on increasing non-fossil fuel capacity and achieving the target of 500 GW of non-fossil fuel-based installed capacity by 2030 provides significant long-term opportunities for solar EPC, rooftop, off-grid and distributed renewable energy projects.
- **Expansion of Rooftop Solar:** The continued implementation of the PM Surya Ghar: Muft Bijli Yojana is expected to accelerate residential rooftop solar adoption. Growing demand from commercial, institutional and government customers also provides opportunities for the Company to expand its rooftop solar EPC and O&M business.
- **Government-Led Solar Programmes:** Schemes and programmes such as PM-KUSUM, PM Surya Ghar Muft Bijli Yojana and other Central and State renewable energy initiatives are creating opportunities in solar pumps, rooftop systems, decentralised/off-grid systems and other distributed solar applications.
- **Growth in Off-Grid and Decentralised Solar:** Increasing demand for reliable electricity in remote and underserved areas is creating opportunities for off-grid solar systems, solar-powered water pumping, decentralised power plants and associated energy solutions, particularly in the North-Eastern and other geographically challenging regions.
- **Expansion of O&M and Long-Term Services:** Increasing installed solar capacity is creating a growing requirement for operations and maintenance, annual maintenance contracts, remote monitoring and performance management services. This provides opportunities for the Company to develop recurring revenue streams alongside EPC activities.
- **Technological Advancement:** Developments in smart inverters, remote monitoring, IoT-based energy management, improved energy storage systems, advanced modules and predictive maintenance technologies are creating opportunities for more efficient and value-added solar solutions.
- **Increasing Private and Institutional Investment:** Growing participation by private companies, financial institutions, public sector organisations and other institutional

investors in renewable energy projects is expected to create additional opportunities for solar EPC and allied services.

THREATS & CHALLENGES

- **Increasing Competition from Large Players:** The entry and expansion of financially stronger and vertically integrated companies into the solar EPC market, including larger rooftop and utility-scale projects, may intensify competition for orders and exert pressure on margins.
- **Aggressive Tender Pricing:** Competitive bidding, particularly in government and institutional tenders, can result in aggressive pricing. This may adversely affect project margins, particularly for EPC contractors with comparatively limited financial resources and purchasing power.
- **Working Capital and Receivables Risk:** Long project execution cycles and delays in collection of receivables can increase debtor days and working capital requirements. Any significant deterioration in collections may adversely affect the Company's liquidity and ability to fund ongoing projects.
- **Input Cost and Supply Chain Risks:** Volatility in the prices and availability of solar modules, inverters, electrical equipment, structures and other components, as well as changes in logistics costs, may affect project costs and profitability where contracts do not provide adequate price escalation protection.
- **Financing and Interest Rate Risk:** Solar EPC projects require access to adequate working capital and banking facilities. Higher borrowing costs, changes in lending norms or restrictions on credit availability may increase the Company's financing costs and affect its ability to undertake larger projects.
- **Regulatory and Technological Changes:** Changes in renewable energy regulations, technical standards, grid-connectivity requirements, import policies, domestic-content requirements or rapid technological developments may require the Company to continuously adapt its products, processes and project execution capabilities.

FINANCIAL AND OPERATIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

The Company recorded revenue from operations of ₹38.61 crore during FY 2025–26, compared with ₹41.09 crore in the previous year. Despite the moderation in revenue, the Company delivered a significant improvement in profitability, with Profit Before Exceptional Items and Tax increasing to ₹1.89 crore from ₹0.85 crore, while Profit After Tax increased to ₹0.84 crore from ₹0.63 crore.

INTERNAL CONTROL SYSTEMS AND THEIR ADEQUACY

Pursuant to the requirements of Section 134(3)(q) of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 8(5)(viii) of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014, the Board of Directors confirms that the Company has in place adequate internal financial controls commensurate with the size, scale, and nature of its business operations.

These internal financial controls are designed to provide reasonable assurance with regard to the reliability of financial reporting, ensuring the orderly and efficient conduct of business, adherence to applicable laws, safeguarding of assets, prevention and detection of frauds and errors, accuracy and completeness of accounting records, and the timely preparation of financial and operational information.

The internal financial controls have been formally laid down through policies, procedures, and authorization manuals and are reviewed on a periodic basis by the management and the Board. The Audit Committee also oversees the adequacy and effectiveness of such controls through regular internal audit reviews and discussions with statutory auditors.

During the financial year under review, the internal financial controls were tested and evaluated and were found to be adequate and effective. No reportable material weakness was observed in the design or operation of such controls.

RISKS AND CONCERNS

Every business involves a balance between risk and return, and Agni Green Power Limited (“AGNI” or “the Company”) remains committed to creating sustainable value for its stakeholders while maintaining a prudent approach to risk management. The management continues to focus on cost efficiency, operational discipline and effective utilisation of resources, supported by regular review of market conditions, project opportunities and business risks.

During the reporting financial year, AGNI identified and monitored key risks associated with its operations, including intense competition in the solar EPC industry, high working capital requirements, dependence on timely realisation of receivables, pricing pressure in competitive tenders, dependence on suppliers, project execution risks and changes in government policies and renewable energy programmes. The Company continues to strengthen its processes and systems to identify, assess and mitigate these risks on an ongoing basis.

At the same time, the Company sees significant opportunities arising from the continued growth of India's renewable energy sector, particularly in rooftop solar, off-grid and decentralised solar solutions, solar-powered water pumping, government and institutional projects, and long-term operations and maintenance services. The Company's established presence in Eastern and North-Eastern India, together with its EPC, O&M and manufacturing capabilities, provides a platform for pursuing these emerging opportunities.

AGNI's management and senior leadership regularly review operational, financial and market risks and take appropriate measures to mitigate their potential impact. The Company's internal control framework covering financial, operational and compliance processes is periodically reviewed and monitored by the management and the Board. The Audit Committee provides oversight over the adequacy and effectiveness of internal financial controls and the overall risk management framework.

Based on the assessments undertaken during the year, no material weakness in the design or operation of the Company's internal financial controls was identified. The Company remains committed to continuously strengthening its risk management and internal control systems in line with its evolving scale of operations and business requirements.

The company has written off doubtful debts from the books amounting to Rs. 74.96 lakhs from the profit before exceptional and extraordinary item and tax for the financial year ended 31st of March 2026.

Earnings per Share:

The Earnings per Share of the Company as on 31st March, 2026 is Rs. 0.43 per share for Face Value of Rs. 10/- as against Rs. 0.32 per share for Face Value of Rs. 10/- in the previous financial year.

Note 1 : SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. Company background

Agni Green Power Ltd. (the Company) is a public company, domicile in India and incorporated under the provisions of the Companies Act, 1956. The Company is engaged in the business of manufacture/assembly of Solar Photovoltaic Power Plants, Solar Lamps and other Solar products and erection, installation and servicing the same. The Company is a Small and Medium Sized Company (SMC) as defined in the General Instructions in respect of Accounting Standards as notified under the Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2006 and the relevant provisions of the Companies Act 2013. Accordingly the Company complies with the Accounting Standards as applicable to a Small and Medium Sized Company.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES :

a. Basis of Preparation :

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) in India using the Historical Cost convention on accrual basis. These financial statements have been prepared to comply in all material aspects with the accounting standards specified under section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 7 of Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014 and the relevant provisions of The Companies Act, 2013. The accounting policies adopted in the presentation of the financial statements are consistent with those followed in the previous year.

b. Current & non-current classification and operating cycle :

All the Assets and Liabilities have been classified as Current or Non-Current as per the Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in the Schedule III to The Companies Act 2013. Based on the present activities of the Company the classification between Current and Non-Current Assets and Liabilities has been made on the basis of twelve months.

c. Use of Estimates :

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles in India (GAAP) requires Management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent liabilities as on the date of the financial statements and the results of operations during the reporting period. Although these estimates are based upon Management's best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results could differ from these estimates.

d. Fixed Assets :

Tangible Assets:

Fixed Assets are stated at cost of acquisition and amounts added on revaluation less accumulated depreciation and impairment loss, if any. Cost comprises the purchase price and any cost directly attributable to bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

Subsequent expenditure related to an item of fixed assets is added to its book value only if it increases the future benefits from the existing asset beyond its previously assessed standard of performance. Projects under which assets are not ready for their intended use are shown as Capital Work-in-Progress.

Intangible Assets

Intangible assets are stated at cost of acquisition less accumulated amortization/depletion and impairment loss, if any. The cost comprises purchase price and any cost directly attributable to bringing the asset to its working condition for the intended use and adjustments arising from exchange rate variations attributable to the intangible assets.

e. Depreciations and amortizations

Depreciation on tangible fixed assets are provided on Written Down Value Method (WDV) based on useful life of the assets as prescribed in Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013 and considering residual value to be 5% of cost and in cases where written down value as on 31.03.2014 was less than 5% of cost, Re.1 for each individual/block of assets (as the case may be). Depreciation on fixed assets added/disposed-off during the year is provided on pro-rata basis with respect to date of acquisition/ disposal.

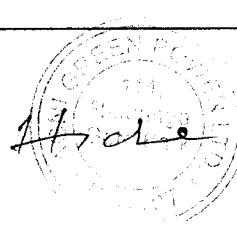
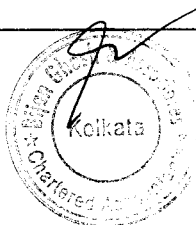
Amortization/Depreciation on intangible fixed assets are provided on Written Down Value Method (WDV) based on useful life of the assets and considering residual value to be 5% of cost and in cases where written down value as on 31.03.2014 was less than 5% of cost, Re. 1 for each individual/block of assets (as the case may be). Useful life of the asset is the period over which the asset is expected to be available for use.

Leasehold improvement, wherever applicable, is amortized on a straight-line basis over the period of lease. No scrap value is considered while depreciating the same.

In case of impairment, if any, depreciation is provided on the revised carrying amount of the assets over its remaining useful life.

Amortisation is calculated to write-off the cost of intangible assets less their estimated residual values using the written-down method over their estimated useful lives, and is recognised in Statement of profit or loss. The estimated useful lives for current and comparative periods are as follows:

- i) Technology Development Charges : over the lease period i.e., 10 years
- ii) Software Licenses : 5 years
- iii) Technical knowhow : 5 years



f. Investment

Investments, which are readily realizable and intended to be held for not more than a year from the date on which such investments are made, are classified as current investments. All other investments are classified as long-term investments. Non-current investments are carried at cost. Provision for diminution in the value of non-current investments is made only if such reduction is other than temporary.

g. Borrowing Costs

Borrowing costs that are attributable to the acquisition or constructions of qualifying assets are capitalized as part of the cost of the assets. A qualifying asset is one that necessarily takes substantial period of time to get ready for intended use. All other borrowing costs are charged to revenue.

h. Income Recognition :

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured.

(i) Sale of Products - Income is recognized on the basis of the invoices raised on successful installation and commissioning of a solar photovoltaic power plant project for solar powered electrification or on dispatch of a solar powered product to a customer.

(ii) Rendering of Service - Revenue is recognized on completion of rendering of the service in terms of the relevant work order.

(iii) Interest - Interest from bank deposits is recognized as per certificate of income received from bank on time proportion basis or interest credited to bank account.

(iv) Other Income and Dividend - These are recognized on receipt basis.

i. Foreign Currency transactions :

Initial Recognition: Foreign currency transactions are recorded in the functional currency by applying the spot exchange rate between the functional currency and the foreign currency at the date of the transaction. Foreign currency monetary items outstanding at the Balance Sheet date are restated at year end rates. Gain / Loss arising there from and arising on conversion at point of realization have been booked to Foreign Exchange Fluctuation Account in accordance with AS11.

j. Inventories

Inventories have been valued at lower of cost or net realizable value in accordance with AS-2 applying first-in-first-out method (FIFO). The cost of inventories comprise all costs of purchase, costs of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in ordinary course of business, less estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make sale.

k. Employee Benefits

Short term benefits: these are employee benefits (other than termination benefits) that are due to be settled within twelve months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service. All undiscounted amount of short term benefits accounted for on accrual basis.

Post-Employment Benefits: Defined Contribution Plans: defined contribution plans are post-employment benefit plans under which an entity pays fixed contributions into a separate entity (a fund) and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay further contributions if the fund does not hold sufficient assets to pay all employee benefits relating to employee service in the current and prior periods. The Company makes specific contribution towards Provident Fund, Pension Scheme and Gratuity Scheme. These are recognized as expense in profit and loss account during the period in which the employee renders the related service.

l. Income Taxes:

Provisions for both current and deferred taxes are made in the books. Current tax is measured on the basis of taxable income using applicable tax rates and tax laws. Current tax for current and prior periods, to the extent unpaid, is recognized as a liability. If the amount already paid in respect of current and prior periods exceeds the amount due for those periods, the excess are recognized as an asset. Deferred tax is recognized subject to the consideration of prudence. In respect of deferred tax is the tax effect on temporary (timing) differences being the difference between taxable income and accounting income that originate in one period and are capable of reversal in one or more subsequent periods and is measured using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the Balance Sheet date. Deferred tax assets are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date to reassess its realization.

m. Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets

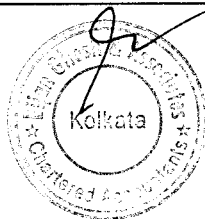
Provision is recognized in the accounts when there is a present obligation as a result of past event(s) and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. Provisions are recognized at undiscounted present value of the best estimate required to settle the obligation at the reporting date. These estimates are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

Contingent liabilities are disclosed unless the possibility of outflow of resources is remote.

Contingent assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the financial statement.

n. Impairment of Financial Assets

The Company assesses on a forward-looking basis the expected credit loss associated with its financial assets which are not fairly valued through profit or loss. The impairment methodology applied depends on whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk.
